Questions People Ask

Q. Why should we pray for the souls in Purgatory?

A. Just as one part of the physical body can help another by soothing a suffering or sharing a burden; as parts of the Mystical Body of Christ we can help one another in spiritual ways. Membership of the Mystical Body extends beyond the grave. For our beloved departed who are being purified until they reflect the total brightness of the beatific vision, our ways of spiritual assistance are prayer, especially participation in the Mass, works of generosity and offering our sufferings in union with the redemptive suffering of Jesus.

Love of God and Neighbour

The gospels bring us right to the heart of what a Christian life involves: love of God and of neighbour. Jesus tells us that having life both now and in the future is the fruit of living in the spirit of love. With media today, we are brought face to face with suffering, poverty and hunger so vast that is can engender a feeling of helplessness and hopelessness.

The gospels challenge us about how we react when we come face to face with a person in need. Bring to mind the people who have been an inspiration to you by the care and attention they have given to others.

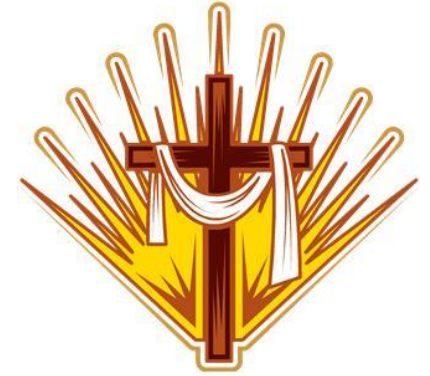
Trust in God

To those, who in their enthusiasm and first fervor had thought that Jesus was to bring an end to suffering, war and hate, Luke brings the reminder, to them and to us, that it's not so.

Yet we should never get dismayed or lose heart. Jesus had told his followers what to expect, but he also said that they would never meet tribulation alone as he himself would help in their defence.

Get a toothache – take a Dispirin. Get a headache – take a Panadol. We seek instant relief from pain with tablets. Our prayer is often the same. We pray for relief, for a cure. Jesus, in today's Gospel, implies that there is another valid prayer – the prayer for fortitude, to live out the pain, the prayer for strength and support to face the betrayals. The antidote to fear is trust, trust in God and in his love and care for us. Jesus tells how far that care goes, 'not a hair of your head will be lost'. That's the safety-net that cushions us against the threats and betrayals of life. Our response now, if we are to be ready then, is perseverance and endurance. You cannot save time you can only use it wisely and well. As Paul put it 'go on quietly working'. The gift of endurance will bring us to eternal life. It is a gift worth praying for.
