QUESTIONS PEOPLE ASK

Jesus was not criticised, he was crucified. The eye is made for light but light hurts the sick eye: the stomach is made for food but food upsets the sick stomach: the soul is made for God but the light of God's goodness enrages the sick soul. Criticism reveals more about the critic than the object of criticism.

Wed 29 – St. Martha, sister of Lazarus and Mary, a woman of faith who made her profession of faith in Christ as the Son of God.

Thurs 30 – St Peter Chrysologus, died around the year 450. He was Bishop of Ravenna and famous for his teaching.

Friday 31 – St. Ignatius of Loyola, 1491 – 1556, from the north of Spain. His great theme was the service of God and God's greater glory. The experience of his conversion led to his writing of the Spiritual Exercises.

Sat August 1st – St. Alphonsus Liguori, 1696 – 1787, founder of the Redemptorist Congregation, taught much on moral theology and the spiritual life.
