Questions People Ask!

Q. When we speak of the 'real presence' of Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament, does it imply that his presence in other ways, for instance in scripture, is unreal ?

A. It is confusing because normally *real* means that something is true as opposed to untrue or phoney. But in Eucharistic theology the word *real* is used in the sense of Latin adjective, *realis*, which means pertaining to some particular material or thing. The so called 'real presence' indicates the special presence of God in the material of bread and wine. It does not imply that other modes of divine presence are unreal or untrue.

Gardening the Soul

On Saturday afternoon, 15 August 1998, thirty people were murdered by a terrorist bomb in the town of Omagh in County Tyrone in Northern Ireland. Exactly one week later, to the very hour and minute, the people of Ireland were invited to stand in silence to remember Omagh, and we did. Hundreds and thousands of men, women and children stopped and remembered the people who had been killed, injured and bereaved. I stood at that moment in a little church on Achill Island and it struck me, as we stood together in solidarity and mourning, that the bombing of Omagh was not just an evil act of a small group, but was also connected to our evil, my evil and yours – our lack of peace with ourselves and with others, our refusal to forgive. If our act of solidarity meant anything, it had to be a turning outward with a new promise of bringing about peace and justice.
